THE TEAMWORK PROJECT is funded by Employment & Social Development Canada under the Migrant Worker Support Program.

The purpose of the project is to provide migrant workers with information about their rights and responsibilities while living and working in Canada; specifically, the project aims to:

- increase migrant workers' awareness and understanding of their rights and responsibilities through educational activities and/or educational material
- empower migrant workers to exercise their rights by providing or assisting in accessing services available to them
- foster inclusion and welcoming of migrant workers through social, cultural, and/or recreational events
- support migrant workers during emergency situations
- foster new partnerships or leverage existing partnerships/networks to support migrant workers
- develop and implement coordinated approaches among community organizations, and/or build their capacity and knowledge to provide resources and services to migrant workers.

Eligibility for Services Under the MWSP:

The TeaMWork Project supports migrant workers across the Windsor-Sarnia economic region, this includes Windsor-Essex, Chatham-Kent, and Sarnia-Lambton.

Per ESDC's guidelines, this project supports:

"'Temporary foreign workers' or 'migrant workers' refering to foreign nationals who have, or had been, issued a work permit under the TFW Program, or have been issued an employer-specific work permit under the International Mobility Program."

The Project launched on **October 1, 2022** and is scheduled to continue until **March 31, 2024**.

The TeaMWork Project is guided and informed by a Steering Committee made up of representatives from:

- industry
- local and regional government
- chambers of commerce
- Ontario Health
- post-secondary institutions
- local immigration partnerships

The TeaMWork Project has re-distributed funding to 11 sub-agreement holder projects in Windsor-Essex, Chatham-Kent and Sarnia-Lambton areas, providing supports such as: legal services, mental health support, recreational activities, community and cultural activities, health and safety information, service navigation, language classes, health care, case management, emergency supports. Partners often collaborate with each other to provide support and bring events to the region.

TEAMWORK PROJECT SUB-AGREEMENT HOLDERS

TeaMWork supports the work of the following organizations.



Adult Language and Learning (ALL)

provides case management support, cultural competency and language training, information sessions, and emergency supports in Chatham-Kent.



Canadian Mental Health Association Windsor-Essex County

Community well-being is our sole focus.

Canadian Mental Health Association Windsor-Essex County Branch (CMHA

WECB) provides mental health outreach across Windsor-Sarnia via greenhouse visits, group sessions, and workplace orientation, along with one-on-one supports.



Chatham-Kent Community Health

Centres (CKCHC) provides Migrant Workers in Chatham-Kent with primary health care, mental health and addiction support, and community outreach via flu clinic, health fairs, information sessions, and health promotion.

Family Services Windsor Essex (FSWE) provides emergency mental health counseling, supportive counseling sessions, including virtual, group, and visits to remote locations across the region.



Legal Assistance of Windsor (LAW) provides legal and social work support, information sessions, worker-led mental and physical health activities, art and recreation, and emergency supports across the region.



Migrant Worker Community Program (MWCP) provides service navigation assistance, drop-in centres and daily supports, community events, cultural celebrations, information sessions, interpretation and translation, and field trips across the region.



North Lambton **Community Health Centre**

North Lambton Community Health Centre (NLCHC) provides primary health care, transportation support, farm engagement, information sessions, social inclusion, and recreational activities in Sarnia-Lambton.



Occupational Health Clinics for Ontario Workers Inc. (OHCOW) provides occupational health and safety information, individual and aroup supports, information sessions, educational safety materials, and outreach to workers and employers across the region.



South Essex Community Council (SECC) provides case management and service navigation, drop-ins and daily supports, English language classes, transportation, community outreach, health navigation, and emergency supports in Windsor-Essex.



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COMMUNITY PARTNERS TeaMWork works closely with the following nonfunded community partners.



Active Care Response Team (ACRT) promotes health and wellness locally and globally. The community outreach team supports migrant workers with essential knowledge, ESL studies, healthcare access, vaccine education, and mental health counseling.



C.A.R.E. for International Workers (Windsor-Essex Bilingual Legal Clinic) assists Temporary Foreign Workers in understanding and asserting their legal rights while promoting health and wellness. Collaborating with 10 partners, C.A.R.E. offers non-profit legal services to low-income individuals in Windsor and Essex County.



The Consulate of Mexico in Leamington

offers comprehensive assistance to Mexican nationals in Canada, including Migrant Workers under the Seasonal Agricultural Worker Program. Services include consular protection, immigration aid, human rights support, educational and health guidance, and assistance with legal and family matters.



The Diocese of London Migrant Workers Ministry (DOL MWM) offers spiritual support and collaborates with community partners to enhance assistance for Migrant Workers. With a Spanish-speaking priest, the ministry provides Spanish mass, transportation, personal assistance, and supports spiritual growth.



Unity Hopeful supports Caribbean Migrant Workers in Windsor-Essex. They provide information on Canadian Culture, organize cultural events and celebrations, and offer food and basic needs supports.



Windsor-Essex Community Health Centre (WeCHC) aims to support the people of Windsor and Essex County by offering equitable, safe, quality care that is clientcentered and close to home. WeCHC hosts a walk-in clinic every Sunday to serve the Migrant Worker population in Learnington and surrounding areas.

bottles of eye drops to help reduce eye strain and prevent development of pterygium.





"I am a 45-year-old Thai individual who has been on the migrant worker program for the past 9 years. For the first 8 years, I worked as a temporary greenhouse worker in Chatham before relocating to Petrolia in September 2022. Initially, adapting to life here posed challenges, particularly due to the absence of a support system for issues such as illness or transportation. About 4 months ago, I had the fortune of meeting Andrea, who is involved in the Migrant Worker project at North Lambton Community Health Centre. She introduced us to her program, and although initially skeptical, within just one month, my perspective changed. The project has proven to be immensely beneficial, offering resources such as bike and road safety training and enabling us to navigate roads safely. Additionally, we have gained access to dental and health services, with the NLCHC Team consistently ensuring we receive medical attention when needed. Moreover, the program has provided opportunities for us to know our rights and many enjoyable activities like the Christmas Parade, Cooking Class, and Christmas Dinner. I am sincerely grateful to the Migrant Worker Project for their dedicated efforts. They have not only made me realize that Canada offers more than just employment opportunities but also that the country pays attention to the well-being of migrant workers. I genuinely feel a warm welcome here."

*One migrant worker we assisted had surgery a few months ago. We provided interpretation and translation support, and guided him through the entire process. He expressed deep gratitude everytime we helped him and couldn't find the words to thank us enough. On the day of his operation, as he was about to enter the operating room, he told us

'thank you for being here. I have no family, and I don't speak English. Having you here means a lot to me.'

This special case made us realize that our role as interpreters goes beyond just language; we can profoundly impact someone's life by simply being there for them. He was thrilled to have an organization like ours and has returned for help on several occasions. Remarkably, **he has now become one of our volunteers and actively contributes in any way he can.** This heartwarming story demonstrates the power of human connection and the meaningful difference we can make by lending a helping hand."

MOVING FORWARD

Lessons learned and challenges encountered through the first year of the MWSP.

Topics of Interest to Migrant Workers

- Health coverage (OHIP, private insurance coverage);
- Labour rights (payment issues, breach of contract, dismissal, harassment in the workplace);
- Government benefits available to workers (CPP, EI, WSIB);
- Tax information (filing & returns);
- Immigration (Pathways to Permanent Residency, Open Work Permits for Vulnerable Workers);

Types of Emergency Situations

- Food and basic needs insecurity;
- Short term housing and rental supports;
- Emergency transportation and follow-up visits as a result of an emergency;
- Social support and outreach to workers in crisis;
- Mental health supports;

Challenges Faced & Lessons Learned

- Exploring effective methods to connect with workers, including the use of WhatsApp, understanding cellphone coverage limitations and international SIM cards, scheduling programming during peak growing seasons, and identifying suitable media platforms and spaces in the community such as churches where workers can connect.
- Utilizing demographic data to shape programming decisions, despite challenges in accessing comprehensive information about workers' origins, settling locations, and duration of stay.
- Establishing and nurturing relationships with local employers.
- Enhancing connections and relationships with workers from the Caribbean.
- Gaining insights into various programs (IMP, SAWP, TFW) and understanding the associated benefits and limitations of each.
